Common Exception Words

In the early years, it is important the children understand that individual letters and groups of letters (graphemes) represent sounds in spoken words. This idea is fundamental to the children's reading and spelling of all words. As the children build up their knowledge of grapheme—phoneme correspondences (GPCs), they also need to be aware that some high frequency words have unusual GPCs. These words are known as 'common exception words' and the children need to learn to recognise them, as they cannot decode them by relying just on their phonic knowledge.

Some words can be classed as common exception words if the children have not yet learnt the sounds that are represented by some graphemes. This means that once the children learn these GPCs, the words are no longer classed as common exception words. Other words have such unusual GPCs that they will always be regarded as common exception words.

English National Curriculum Common Exception Words

The English National Curriculum includes a list of common exception words that the children need to recognise by the end of Year 1. These words are so common in the English language that the sooner the children learn them, the more confident they will be in their reading. Note that this list is not exhaustive. Different phonics programmes may include more or fewer words than shown in this list.

Letters and Sounds Common Exception Words

The Early Years *Letters and Sounds* teaching programme contains a similar list of common words containing GPCs that are unusual, or not taught at the earliest levels. This list contains words that the children are expected to be able to read by the end of Year 1. Note that many words are covered in both lists.
